COMMENT

Chess has probably had more publicity in the last few months than at any other time in this country, especially in the London area.

Not only is the musical "Chess", (loosely based on World Title matches from 1972 onwards), playing in the West End, but London's Park Lane Hotel is the venue for the first half of the return match between Kasparov and Karpov, from 28 July onwards. We've seen Kasparov on the Wogan show, there are to be regular TV reports on the match itself, and 5-minute chess has drawn crowds on the concourse at Waterloo station.

There has also been an historic match in Basle between a British Grandmaster (Tony Miles) and the current World Champion; Kasparov won 5-0 with one drawn game. ("Playing a game against Kasparov is like playing three games against anybody else. It's very hard to put into words. There are no quiet moves, no simple positions...He drains you." - Miles.)

Yet for all this publicity, you could be forgiven for thinking that no chess is played in the suburbs. It takes a substantial effort to discover that there are chess clubs in Kingston, Sutton, Richmond, Hampton and Surbiton. When I joined this club a few years ago, I discovered it quite by accident because I happened to walk along Eden Street.

Chess isn't mentioned in "What's On in Kingston", published by Kingston Leisure. nor is there an entry in the Thomson Local Directory, even though both these publications list Sports Clubs and Associations of various sorts. Local libraries will display advertisements for local clubs, but I've never seen one for chess. Local papers will publish items of interest if they are supplied with copy but chess seems conspicuous by its absence.

Shouldn't we do our best to ensure that people know about our activities? Isn't it in our interests to encourage new members to join? Or don't we care about it?

Consultation Game

White: Harris + Inwood + Roche Black: Byrne + Groom + Wilkinson

(Notes by J.P.Wilkinson: based on what I remember of the analysis at the time!)

1 d3 f5 2 e4 Nc6 (Black is aiming for a Nimzowitsch/Dutch set-up) 3 ef5 Nf6 (To forestall Qb5+.) 4 Bg5 Ne5!? (Aiming for f7 to block the threatened check, and to protect Rh8 in some lines.) 5 d4 Nf7 6 B:f6 ef6 7 Nc3 (This was a surprise. We expected White to advance the c-pawn at some stage, with the knight on d2. The text gives White doubled pawns on the c-file, and Black has some compensation - but not much! - for the pawn deficit.) 7...Bb4 8 Qe2+ Qe7 (If 8...Be7? 9 Nd5. Black's loss of castling is not too important if queens are exchanged.) 9 0-0-0 B:c3 10 bc3 d5 (Black needs to activate his queen-side pieces even at the cost of a hole on e6. Black now threatens the pawn on f5, and prepares ... Nd6.) 11 g4 h5 (Black must play actively.) 12 Rel Q:e2 13 N:e2 (Since White now threatens the pawns on h5 and d5 after the discovered check, Black abandons the d-pawn.) 13...hg4 14 Nf4+ Kd8 15 Nd5 (At this point we spent a long time looking at 15...B:f5, but eventually rejected it in view of 16 N:c7. White also threatens 16 Re7, but things get very complicated if White goes pawn-grabbing along the seventh rank and allows ... Be4.) 15... c6 16 Ne3 (16 Nc7!?) 16... Nd6 17 Bd3 Rh5 18 Reg1 (Another surprise. We thought the rook should stay on the open file.) 18...N:f5 19 B:f5 B:f5 20 N:f5 R:f5 21 R:g4 (We had decided that Black could hold this ending as long as the king moved to c7 to release the Ra8, and White didn't get his rooks connected. White has four pawn islands to Black's two, and the doubled c-pawns don't help him.) 21...g5 22 f4 (We thought 22 h4 better.) 22...R:f4 23 R:f4 gf4 24 Rf1 (The exchange of rooks has helped the defence: the passed h-pawn can be blocked.) 24...Ke7 25 R:f4 Rh8 26 h4 Rh5 (Black's plan is to maintain control of the fifth rank and play passively, waiting for White to try something.) 27 c4 Kf7 28 Kb2 Ke6 29 Kb3 b6 30 a4 Kf7 31 Re4 (If 31 Kb4 c5+) 31...Rf5 32 c3 Rf2?? (Black's plan is forgotten. We considered 32...Rf1 to threaten back-rank checks and get behind the passed pawn, but decided in the end to cut off the king from behind. We completely overlooked the fact that we'd now lost control of the fifth rank.) 33 d5 (Of course! We now thought that White had enough to win.) 33... cd5 34 cd5 f5 (Both teams were now short of time, and Black's attempt at active play is a touch desperate.) <u>35 Rd4 Rg2 36 Kc4 a6 37 d6</u> (Here the second question-mark was added to Black's 32nd move!) <u>37...Ke8 38</u> Kd5 Kd7 39 Ke5 Rf2 40 Kf6 f4 41 h5 Rh2 (Black hopes to cut off White's king in front of the h-pawn.) 42 Kg6 Rg2+ 43 Kf5 f3 44 Rf4 Rh2 45 Kg4 f2 46 Rf6 Rg2+ 47 Kh3 Rg5 48 Kh4 (If 48 h6? Rh5+ followed by ...R:h6.) 48...Rg2 (An offer to repeat the position.) 49 h6 (And now the same idea allows Black to escape.) 49...Rh2+ 50 Kg3 R:h6! Draw agreed.
