Editorial

It appeared to me that there was no possibility of making any sort of attacking move whatsoever. The game only lasted half an hour or so. I played Black. Oh well! Nevermind! Try and do better next time! I felt that I might have had a better chance if I was playing further up, (I was on board six) where there were two ungraded players.

Maidenhead had two home games on that same day, and after my game I watched a young girl of about seven play. I was most impressed! She managed a draw against a much older and more experienced player I wish I could play as well as she did!

Ticking Over Nicely . . .

Last month at the club I came across one of the club's chess clocks. It was broken, Oh it tick-tocked okay, but the push buttons at the top did nothing!

So being somewhat mechanically minded, I took it home to see if anything could be done to get it back in working order again. Taking it to bits, I discovered that the Push buttons were activated by a plastic lever, which was 'rocker' pinnioned at the centre. and that at each end of the lever there was a small metal plunger that when pushed down, prevented the one clock from working, at the same time it released the other clock and allowed it to work. This plastic lever had snapped. Simple! I thought. Bit of super glue and Bobs your uncle! Things are never as simple as you think are they? I glued the two halves together, then decided that the constant strain on the super glue would soon have the clock back to 'not working' again, so in order to strengthen the repair, I glued a small strip of plastic across the repaired joint, Which was approx. a quarter way along the lever, I then thought that this might unbalance the action so I glued another strip on the other half of the lever. This would also strengthen it. All this worked fine when I reassembled the clock, but I could not stop both clocks at the same time! Although by pushing both buttons down an equal amount, it was possible to have both clocks going at the same time! So I dismantled it all again and found that I had to readjust the little metal plungers, (They were not going down far enough!) Quite fiddly!

However, success in the end. The clock is now fully functional and ticking over nicely! The following Monday it was returned to the club. I know I am not of much use in any of the teams, except to avoid a 'Default' But it is nice to know that the club has some benefit of my membership, apart from the newsletter!



1. d4 c6
2. c4 e6
3. e4 Ne7
4. Nc3 b5
5. cxb5 cxb5
6. Nxb5 a6??

At this stage it was vital to move either the Knight at e7 or the Queen or the "d" pawn!

7. Nd6 Mate!

Apparently it is quite common practice in Correspondence chess to have some weird and unusual openings, to try and get your opponent to come away from the more conventional openings and possibly throw them off! This time it was fatal!



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


